

LOGLINE

At his father's death, a successful kickboxer must face his hidden past and brotherly rival, forcing him to choose between family and victory.





ACT

We are introduced to Logan "Fury" Sharppe who overtakes his opponent in a kickboxing match and snaps, taking the match too far. In the aftermath, we learn that this great and powerful kickboxer, Logan Sharppe, is the mask that Jake Andino wears in the big city.

Jake ran away from his small town and swore never to come back. After his match, he gets a call from an old high school friend, Chris, the only person he's stayed in touch with, that his father passed. With some 'firm' encouragement from his coach, he sets off to finally return home. When he returns home for his father's funeral, he's met with the dreaded encounter of his 'perfect' older brother, Alex. Alex finds Jake at the funeral and is surprisingly ecstatic to see his long-lost brother. He invites Jake to catch up over dinner.







ACT II





Jake, Alex, and Alex's pregnant wife, Bianca, share an awkward dinner. Alex tries to get some answers out of Jake, but Jake decides to keep his successful kickboxing career a secret since Alex wished to be a successful kickboxer too. Jake finds out that Alex still kickboxes, but only locally, and plans to retire after his last match. Jake volunteers to help, after finding out that Alex doesn't have anyone to practice with.

Jake puts off traveling home for a full week and stays with his brother in their old home. Staying continues to trigger old memories, both nostalgic and traumatic, as he trains with his older brother and reconnects with old friends over dinner, bowling, and other activities. Bianca, who's been more direct about questioning why Jake never bothered to return home, apologizes to Jake when he helps her through painful contractions. Throughout Jake's time home, he starts to realize just how much his absence has affected everyone and how much he's missed out.

Eventually, Bianca thinks she is going into labor. Alex and Jake rush her to the hospital. They find out it was prodromal labor, but they both decide to wait it out together with Bianca. When Jake goes to the bathroom, Alex watches the TV. The soccer match ends, and the Kickboxing segment plays. Alex watches Logan's recent match and realizes Logan is Jake. When Jake returns, he fails to explain why he lied, and they get into a heated argument that opens old wounds. Jake comes home early, and Alex continues to train on his own. Alex has his baby. Alex wins his last match, but instead of choosing to retire, he outs his brother and challenges him to a match.

ACT III

Jake and Alex gear up to fight each other. Bianca tries to talk Alex out of fighting but convinces her otherwise. At the fight, Jake has the upper hand in skill and training. He wins the first round. Alex takes the second. Jake snaps into his animal state and fights hard. He corners Alex. Alex seems to give up and is willing to take the hits. All of Jake's inner turmoil boils to the surface. Instead of taking it too far, Jake decides to break the cycle and throw the match, ultimately choosing his brother over his internal struggles.

Three years later, Jake and Alex no longer talk, but Jake has taken steps to start therapy and control his fighting urges. Now that he's in a better headspace, he shows up to his nephew's birthday party as a gesture to let Alex know that he does want to try to be in the picture.







TONE & GENRE

Brothers is a powerful sports drama that explores the world of kickboxing and the deep, complex relationships within a family.

As the protagonist returns to his hometown, the film immerses viewers in the raw emotions of homecoming — the nostalgia, the unresolved past, and the bittersweet warmth of familiar places.

LIGHTING PROGRESSION REVEALING JAKE'S INNER WORLD

Lighting shifts with Jake's emotional state-cold and harsh in isolation, warm and natural in connection, then high-contrast in conflict before settling into balance.

Act I - Urban Isolation: Hard, directional lighting with deep shadows and stark overheads. Fluorescents and neon

Act II - Small-Town Warmth: Soft, natural light from windows, lamps, and candles creates intimacy. Shadows are gentler, but cooler tones creep in as tensions rise.

Act III - The Fight & Resolution: A mix of soft and hard light reflects Jake's two worlds colliding. Overhead lighting is softer, while harsh edge and backlights-motivated by practicals and streetlights—intensify the conflict.













CINEMATOGRAPHY

COLOR PROGRESSION

1) Urban Isolation Cool, Sterile Tones

Blues and grays dominate the city, reflecting Jake's isolation despite his success. Cold neon, glass, and steel create a detached, impersonal world where fame feels empty. Shadows and artificial lighting reinforce his loneliness, making even crowded spaces feel distant.

2) Small-Town Warmth Earthy, Nostalgic Hues

Golden yellows, rich browns, and deep greens envelop Jake in the warmth of home. Natural light, wooden textures, and intimate spaces contrast the city's sterility, emphasizing the comfort of family and the authenticity of real connection.



3) Final Conflict Blending Tones

As Jake's internal struggle peaks, urban cool tones seep into warm spaces, while golden hues flicker within the cold cityscape. This visual clash represents his torn identity—fame's allure versus the grounding pull of home—culminating in an ambiguous, emotionally charged resolution.





CINEMATOGRAPHY

Framing choices emphasize power, vulnerability, and emotional distance-contrasting the brothers' worlds and evolving as their relationship shifts.







1) Urban Isolation

Bold, rigid compositions with wide shots emphasize Jake's detachment. Top-down angles highlight his inner vulnerability, while shooting from a distance reinforces isolation.

2) Small-Town Warmth

More intimate framing-closer shots, handheld moments, and shooting from behind create a sense of connection. Unique tilts and shifting angles introduce tension as conflicts surface.

3) The Fight & Resolution

Dynamic and immersive—tight, kinetic framing intensifies the fight, while contrast in angles (low vs. high) amplifies power struggles. As the fight concludes, framing softens, balancing distance and closeness to reflect Jake's internal resolution.

CINEMATOGRAPHY







Our film will stand apart through its innovative sound design, led by a "sound cinematographer" who will be deeply involved from pre-production through post-production. This unique role will craft every sound element from on-set foley to ambient textures-creating a rich, immersive sound environment.

By recording and composing sounds uniquely for each scene, we'll play with the auditory experience, drawing viewers into the emotional and physical world of the story in a way that feels fresh, dynamic, and unforgettable. Sound won't just support the film-it will elevate it, becoming a character in its own right.

PRODUCTION DESIGN

We want to build a production design that feels like "coming home," using warm, earthy tones, cozy interiors filled with personal mementos, and iconic small-town exteriors like a rustic diner or a weathered boxing gym. Every detail will evoke the sentiment of "this is where you belong," creating a nostalgic, emotional anchor for the story.







LOCATIONS

The film takes place in a small New Mexico town where everyone knows everyone, a place where you're on a first-name basis with the cashier at the local grocery store, your barber is your neighbor, and Sunday church is a gathering place. These locations, from the dusty streets to the familiar storefronts, will evoke the warmth and intimacy of a tight-knit community, making it feel like home.



TONE & GENRE

Our target audience is universal, anyone with a sibling or family ties. The film's themes of rivalry, love, and reconciliation will resonate across generations, appealing to both younger audiences who connect with the raw emotion of brotherhood and older viewers who understand the complexities of family dynamics. By focusing on the timeless struggles of family, we aim to reach a broad demographic, uniting viewers through shared experiences and emotions.


